The Klamath Basin Tribal Youth Program will be accepting applications from students interested in evaluating traditional food securities in relationship to Climate Change within the Klamath Basin. The stipend paid Internship is 8-10 weeks from June to August 2016. Students will be responsible for their own meals and incidentals.

The Klamath River flows 263 miles through Southern Oregon and Northern California. It's the second largest river in California, after the Sacramento, and drains a 16,000-square-mile watershed. It is the most important coastal river south of the Columbia River for anadromous fish migration. Its salmon, steelhead and rainbow trout have adapted to unusually high water temperatures and acidity levels relative to other Pacific Northwest rivers.

Six interns will work closely with scientists, natural resource professionals and restoration practitioners in a systematic process evaluating western science and traditional ecological knowledge to better understand the impacts of climate change on ecological and traditionally important resources. This discovery could result in more collaborative tribal and government approaches to climate change adaptation and planning conducted in the Klamath Basin.

INTERNSHIP DUTIES:

- Interns will be placed with professional mentors from tribes, federal agencies and partners to gain experience in local and regional environmental monitoring, analysis, management and policies.
- Interns will work with cultural resource professionals and elders of the Klamath Basin Tribes to understand how Traditional Ecological Knowledge may be integrated with western science to inform natural resource policy and management in the Klamath Basin.
- Interns will focus their efforts on how climate change affects on the environment are impacting cultural communities and practices.

THE KLAMATH BASIN TRIBAL YOUTH PROGRAM (KBTYP) - is a partnership of Federal Agencies, Klamath Basin tribes, colleges, universities and private organizations to empower Native communities by collaborating to provide employment and educational opportunities to tribal youth. To facilitate Native engagement in protecting natural resources, efficient water use, pioneer the development of new energy, tackle climate change issues, enhance wildlife habitat, and restore cultural and historic landmarks.
