50 elders. Attended the Yurok Housing Authority meeting where the Steelhead Lodge and

- 44 Ravenwood were discussed. The Klamath Tsunami trails need to be accessible during these
- 45 storms. The County has stated that the Tsunami warning sirens are the responsibility of the
- 46 Tribe to maintain. Attended a meeting with Klamath Community Services District regarding the
- 47 new tank installation.
- 48 **Councilmember Vanlandingham:** Pass.
- 49 **Councilmember Provolt:** Happy New Year to everyone. I would like to thank the Tribal staff
- and Council for all the emergency assistance provided to the Orick District and others. Also, I
- would like to thank you to the Orick Chamber of Commerce and Orick Community Center for
- 52 their assistance in coordinating emergency food distribution with Food for People and
- Humboldt Made. Community members are encouraged to reach out for any help they may
- 54 need.

James Dunlap:

- Council should develop these corporations into good business with unilateral principles and bylaws.
- There seems to be a bias against our own Tribal Members being able to work within these corporations.
- Is there a sunset clause that can be implemented, because we don't believe our Tribal Members are able to run these businesses?

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Jim McQuillen:

- Corporations are operations where there is the "Cart before the Horse" by not having established Bylaws and policies.
- Looking forward to the Annual Corporations Meeting on January 21, 2023.
- Hoping for an update on the theft that occurred with one of the corporations. Note: Chairman James explained confidentially of this matter.

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Nicole Provolt:

- Managing companies is different than managing people. Both are equally important.
- As a manager you have to be able to have difficult conversations and guide employees.
- In my experience, managers don't give timely evaluations and they don't communicate well with their staff.

- I know we have commercial vehicle drivers upriver that would love that and benefit from it. It's a money saver for Tribal Members. It's about giving money to the State of California and we should not be doing that.

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Jim McQuillen:

- The Tribe could offer Driver Training. The School district doesn't do it anymore.
- I've been pulled over too, held at gun point, and I don't want to create a hostile situation; and we need to stop harassment by CHP.

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Mason Van Mechelen:

- It's really cool to see that our Council deal with the same issues that I do. I was pulled over and the first question was how much I have had to drink. After he was done with that initial contact, then we just talked, and he explained that in his experience there are a lot of drunks "down here."
- Yakima has their own DMV and license plate and it says Yakima Nation. Since I saw that, I have wanted that for us.
- I just paid \$700 to get my truck registration done. That's a huge hit, especially after Christmas.

206	out, because our two largest, most well-funded programs have huge carryovers; TANF			
207	and Promised Neighborhoods.			
208	 Those two programs directly impact our kids, our families, and yet there is unspent 			
209	funds. I would hope that Council would find that as unacceptable as I do.			
210	 Our kids are suffering, we've had a very rough school year, now with Last Chance acting 			
211	up, it's made it worst.			
212	 Yesterday our Margaret Keating kids had to wait over an hour for their bus to pick them
