Bertha Peters: I am wondering, what are you even talking about? Is this something that's been going on for a while? And is it for people calling in for that have foster children?

- Donna Matilton: First of all, you got to get a better system going here. I'm a little concerned
- about all communications, not only what we're talking about now, but I have tried last week to
- call Health & Human Services and I couldn't get anybody. I think that there should be a line to a
- person that answers the phone all the time to talk to the people that call in, because we're not
- getting to talk to anybody accept for Georgianna. We had an emergency thing going on with a
- tribal member who had COVID and I couldn't get ahold of anybody. And then I call your public
- health nurse phone number and no answer. So we just had to just sit and finally Patty McCovey
- 165 call and said the only thing that they could do was deliver food. But I was wanting to know
- what the plan is for people downriver because we are not getting any kind of good information
- on what to do. I think Holly said to call United Indian Health. And I asked her to do that. If we're
- going to tell our membership to call United Indian Health and we don't get an answer then I

would like to suggest that Holly herself fill that gap where she is the go-to person when people need help. If people are sick, they can't do all the calling. Usually you have to get in the car and go find a place so you can get through. If they are sick, they're not going to do that. Or they don't have phones or whatever. And I'm looking for some help and answers. If someone can't breathe then it is getting to be a real serious situation. What kind of help do we have? I suggested that maybe with the fire department down there could've went down and checked on the person. If they're part of the team, they could have went down and checked on these two people. What do we have the nurse for if all she says is to call United Indian Health, don't we have protocols she could follow. We don't have any information on steps to get help for elders. If this team has been working for over two years by now, they could have some type of a protocol statement to go in the paper and posted. I'm in Hoopa and I'm calling for someone downriver in Weitchpec and who couldn't get no help. We don't know if someone is sick at home with COVID when we need to get them to a hospital because the information is confusing. We don't need to have more people die from this COVID because we are in the dark of how to recognize when it's serious enough to get help. If we have Health & Human Services and if we're going to have a Nurse on staff, then we should be able to provide advice to the people. What I experienced, the job is not being done. I don't know what kind of money this person is making, but I would do it for free especially if all you've going to do is to tell people to call United Indian Health. That's just not acceptable. It may sound like it's, I'm being very negative, but that's the bottom line. One life is too much to lose. If we don't develop some type of a plan from these professional people that we pay to take care of us, then we are continuing down a blind road. There are a lot of things to be done and little things like to go check on your elders is very important. I know with me and Hoopa, the ambulance is right there. But downriver, they don't have that. I decided I'm going to start a journal because people call me, a lot of people call me within the east district because we're forgotten. We might get some card about services, but it has very little information. You don't know if you would be able to get services because it may be income based. And this is what I'm hearing from the people. It's just like housing. We know that the rent and housing prices are going up, but yet housing is income based. They say we are over income, but they are not looking at what we're paying out to survive in this world today. Everything comes to a standstill when it comes to our tribal dollars. We should be looking at that. We should be looking at a lot of things because it is not happening for our people. When Bertha got sick on a Friday, I was so upset that if it wasn't so late in the day, I would have called our funders and chewed them out for giving us dollars and not putting an earmark on where it should go because it's not getting to the people. I was going to chew a lot of people out that day. So, I would like to see some protocol of what we're going to do. We don't know if there's another virus that's going to come that is worse than this one. I am at wits end about who I can even call anymore. There is no communication and you can't even enter a building to get verbal communication. I just have to say one more thing. I had a brother about a month ago was sick. They took him out to Mad River. He sat for nine hours in the waiting room. He couldn't hardly walk and had to be on oxygen and finally got into the emergency room. This is how our people are having to survive in this world. If you're going to say we're taking care of our people, then I guess the bottom line is take care of our people as best as you can. That's all I have to say. I could keep you here all day, but I won't.

## TRIBAL MEMBER COMMENT:

Donna Matilton: I had several things - one thing is our firewood for elders. We usually don't the program until the rain starts, but there's an awful lot of wood alongside of the road now. It would be good to be cutting wood right now for the elders, at least it would be seasoned over the summer and we wouldn't have to struggle with the wood in the wintertime. I had the fire department stopped by during the storm and they brought me a case of water. I told them that because the electricity was out that maybe it would be a good idea for them to go check on our elders and check stove pipes and clean them out. With no electricity, I was building a hotter fire and think it would be a good thing to consider because a lot of our elders only have wood heat. We could lose our elders in a fire, but as simple as someone going down and cleaning stove pipes would help prevent a chimney fire. I had a chimney fire once and it's pretty scary. And another thing I've been very concerned about is our kids that go to Klamath Trinity Schools. A lot of our kids are not coming to school because of COVID or because of parents choose not to send them because they're afraid they'll get COVID. I have a granddaughter so I know this firsthand. She got COVID a couple of weeks ago and she's been home and they give her a packet, but no book to do the homework because they don't have enough books. I am going to bring that up to the next school board meeting, but I would like our Education Department to be more concerned about this and help track where students are because they're getting further and further behind. And if they do not have to send home, I think they're in violation of some education code because they should have a book for every student. I'm going to bring it up at the next school board meeting but I would like Council to take some interest in our young people. They are going to be our next leaders. I would like something done, especially in our area. Another thing, tonight there is a board meeting and they're talking about cutting the school board down to five members. I don't know what they are going to combine but I'm really worried again about Down River. It may be that there is just to have one school board representative from Wautek to Weitchpec. I'm thinking we have such small numbers down there that this is why it may be changed. I would not like to see that happen. They are having a meeting tonight at five o'clock at the district office. I think the school board is not the ones that are pushing it this change, but it has something to do with the count of the student in the district. If Mr. Barnes or someone would call the school today and find out more about it, I think that would be a real wise thing. I think they're going to decide by next school board meeting but we need to have tribal input. Another thing, I had an elder asked me, what are they doing with our elders dollars? If they're not going to help us, maybe they should pay that

out. I suggested to some of our elders that maybe we need to have an elders meeting of our own and approach you guys on that because it's our dollars. We should be able to say want we to do with our dollars if we're not being taken care of properly. Thank you.

Bertha Peters: Getting back to the virus that affected a tribal member this last weekend, they were looking for her daughter who lives at the Elders Village to do some shopping. It turns out the person that's in charge there and assisting the elders also had the virus. There are tribal members who just get home from the hospital having some kind of surgery, but there's no one to care for them. No one checks in on. I know Hoopa is the closest clinic, so that's where they'll go, but at least somebody needs to checked on them and help them with shopping. I mean, you need to create a job for someone to check in with elders to see how they're doing and what their needs are. I know you had a Noreen doing that for a while. She was doing it by herself, and she was covering two counties, but at least she checked on some people but we don't have that anymore. And so this gets back to those three people that work with the public health nurse there, and if one of them could do that, otherwise I don't know what they do. I don't know how much paperwork they have to do, or if they even working, but we need to do something about checking on our elders. I talked to United Indian Health Services to try to get some of those kits (COVID tests). And so I talked to Liz O'Rourke and she said, no they didn't have them. And then I said, why not? And she said, well, they do have them, but they are saving them for our staff because when they get the virus, they can check when they can come back to work. So if they can get them for staff, why can't they get enough for the public or the patients? Anyhow, I talked to Lana McCovey on that because I heard she was on the UIHS Board for the tribe, but I haven't heard from her. So I just am worried about everybody really, but mostly, because some of them don't have vehicles. And, you know, it's just very hard for some people. When I talked with Liz, I said everyone needs to communicate between Ki maw', the Yurok Tribe and so that they can figure out how they can get a handle on this virus. Sherri had said that housing, which nobody knew the housing was even involved in the virus thing, would put people up in a motel. And so then when I contacted the housing about it, I talked to one of the girls, but I'm not sure what their name was right now. She said, yes, they would put them up in there, but they don't check if they have food. I asked what hotel you would use because it's quite a long way for family to be going out there daily to check on family to make sure they have food and water. And then she's thought maybe Hoopa had a program. So I also called Mary Jane over at Hoopa and she said, yes, they have put people up over there, but as it's within their district. And so that is something that I didn't know that. If somebody could just let us know who we contact then we wouldn't have to be hollering at you guys, you know? But if we had information and we had somebody go around checking on people, that's what I would like to see happen.

Elizabeth Davis: Can I make a comment please? Ms. Davis. Hi, I just wanted to reiterate what Bertha and Donna had said, because this isn't the first time these things have been brought up. I brought this up a few months back at one of the meetings regarding assistance for elders and possibly creating a position where they went out and checked on the elders. And I had mentioned before some of them can't change light bulbs. They need help with batteries. I had

an elder drive all the way to ask me to help her put batteries in her remote to turn on her heater. And so we need ongoing assistance for the elders that don't have family or transportation to help themselves. I just wanted to reiterate this importance. Things just kind of stopped after the 800 number for OES was no longer being utilized. I don't know what the protocol is and it seems nobody really knows the chain of command on who to call and what steps are available for individuals who are ill and if there's any assistance for them in relation to food, gas, medication pickup, etcetera. So we need a reorganization of that. I have one more comment I'd like to make. I don't know how many of the council members are aware of the blue bag program that we have here. So trash pickup service for the people that live on the reservation. The only catch is they have to purchase a blue bag and the blue bags are \$5 each and the elders get them for \$3. The blue trash bags are picked up on Wednesday and Thursday. Now, the revenue from the blue bag program goes back into the general fund as I understand it. We have a truck that we utilize for this program. I think it was purchased some years back. But when there is a problem with the vehicle, which seems to happen a lot, the lift needs to be fixed, new tires, servicing, etcetera, there's always a problem on how to cover those costs because it's not a GSA, it's a bought outright. So my question is, is there a possibility of creating an account for the revenue of the blue bag to go to for maintenance of that truck and other expenses that may be incurred for the blue bag program? And the same kind of with the transfer site. Now, I know we've needed new bins there for quite some time. And I was asked to get quotes on new bins because they're rested out on the bottom and they need to be replaced. And which I did, I got the bids. This has been probably 3, 4 years ago, and the bins are still in dire need of changing. Is there a possibility of putting that revenue towards purchasing those new bins? Because I don't know what's going to happen once they completely rest out. We don't have a transfer site to dump our trash in anymore. Just a couple of things so that logistically we might be able to fund on our own the repairs and upgrades for those two programs.
