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## **COUNCIL CHECK IN:**

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Councilmember Williams – I had an eventful past couple of weeks. There was a search and rescue mission conducted in the North District for a missing tribal member and I assisted on that search. It opened my eyes to the homeless encampments, the subculture that is in there, and I don't know if anybody else is aware that there's a whole subculture in the homeless encampments with their own hierarchy, their own systems. I've known many of the people that live there. We have a lot of tribal members living in homeless encampments. I kind of had a tour from the tribal member perspective, and it's very, very disturbing. It's very scary. There are people losing their lives in the homeless encampments. There's abuse that our tribal members are being exposed to.

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And on my journey through the homeless encampment, all I could hear in my mind was the mother of this tribal member telling me, find my daughter, please. Do your best. And I put six miles in that day. I was the last person out of that encampment because I was determined to help this family. Unfortunately, I didn't find anything significant, but opened my eyes to abuse that is happening in the woods that we don't see. I'll continue to work on helping these people get out of that cycle they're in. It took me a couple days to decompress from that. I still feel a little in my heart. It hurts.

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- I also attended a meeting here at the tribal building with the under Secretary of the Interior and
- 82 the Chief of Six Rivers National Forest, talking about opportunities to partner with the tribe. And
- 83 during our meeting, they made an announcement that there's 25 million tribal set aside for
- 84 forestry management partnerships. I spoke a lot about workforce development opportunities
- 85 and how important it was for Yurok tribal members to have an opportunity to become foresters.
- 86 For higher education opportunities, to share their knowledge and we as Yurok people are born
- 87 with the instinct to take care of the land and how important that was for us to be involved in

- managing our forests and it went over well. They have a lot of opportunities for internships to pretty much open the door for us and are eager to open the door for young tribal members to work in that field.
- 91 I also attended a meeting with NOAA and the National Marine Fisheries Organization to help us
- 92 in our water fight and the management of our fishing. They have money also to contribute to
- help us manage our water, and manage it after the dams come out, manage our fisheries, they
- 94 were eager to help us. I talked about how one time at the turn of the century, 1900, 1890, 1910,
- 95 up into the 1920s. Where we had the strongest fishery on the coast, and I want to be on the
- 96 front line to restore that glory to where it once was, so that we have hundreds of thousands of
- 97 fish to harvest. Anyway, that's what I did for the last couple of weeks. Thank you.
- 98 **Councilmember Crawford** I had the opportunity to attend the Tribal College a couple weeks
- ago down in Placerville, other tribal employees also attended. It was a good program and ran
- well professionally, they had some very knowledgeable, reputable speakers there, professors
- 101 from across the country. It was nice to review a lot of tribal policy to understand where we're at
- 102 now today as Indian people across the country, and how we need to combine and unite our
- efforts to fight the good fight. Public law 280 getting that looked at also with our water issues,
- gaming issues, land back. They covered pretty much the gamut of what's going on in Indian
- country. I recommend it to anyone. Thank you, Council, for recommending that training for me
- and again, I recommend this training for anyone who wants more knowledge in Indian country.
- 108 They want to try to have it up in this neck of the woods next year. They mentioned maybe Bear
- River. They also had a component for youth. I paid for my 2 daughters to go. They thoroughly
- enjoyed it and got a lot out of it. Their discussions when I saw them again was really a pleasure
- to listen to them talking about issues in Indian country that were brought to their attention at
- this conference at such a young age. It's empowering. We need to get more youth down there
- or at the next one.

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- 114 As far as East District news, I reached out to Mr. Maranger and asked about how I was going as
- far as finding funding for a kitchen. I haven't got anything back yet, in that regard. The East
- 116 District needs a kitchen up there in that building and to offer services equal to all the other
- areas. So, I kind of want to investigate that.
- 118 I'm a little disappointed about the TANF money is going to school children and a lot of school
- children are left out because they're out of the service area. I really do look at this as a great,
- great thing for the children to get an opportunity to get a voucher for school clothes. It seems
- like it was put together quickly and thrown out there at the last minute. I'm just wondering if we
- 122 could do better next time and service those students who live outside the service area. Because
- there's a need and I'm hearing that need from many constituents, their families. Hopefully we
- 124 can do better next time. Thank you.
- 126 **Councilmember Natt** Last week I attended the meeting with Congressman Huffman, and we
- talked about the MMIP and lands legislation and offshore wind. I think it went well. I was

excited to meet and visit a little bit, because it's important to continue to open discussions and our problems and concerns.

**Councilmember McCovey** – Not present.

**Councilmember Ray** – I can provide an update on the Klamath Community Center project. We have the contracts in place. Right now, we are looking for a contractor to do the site prep for the Klamath Tank project. We're also looking for a cleaning company to come in and clean the building.

My timeline for a Grand Opening is this next winter for the community celebrations. We have a lot of PPE in the building that we need to start getting out. We need to start clearing everything out of the building. We need to start getting staff to move into the building within the next couple of months. We are looking at November, mid-November for the tank to be up, the water to be on. I have until then to get this building fully equipped with computers; with everything we need inside it. We need to start working towards getting this building ready for moving in. So that when the water is turned on, it's ready to go. I don't know, Don, if the connex boxes have any room in them, but we got a couple of months to move everything out in the same timeline to move everything in. We need to move all the PPE and all the stuff that's stored in there needs to come out so like Boys and Girls Clubs can start outfitting their room up and all that stuff and get the computers all set up and get departments moved in. Thank you.
