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67	TRIBAL MEMBER COMMENT
68	Rose Sylvia: Pecwan District. I have a question. I know that the tribal council took action to
69	remove Billy Moon from the reservation and he came to Wautek. I went back home and I called
70	the cops and, and they said that nobody was on duty on Sunday, so nobody would do anything.
71	And I had to call Humboldt County. And so, my question is, if it doesn't violate a penal code or a
72	vehicle code, we will Humboldt County respond? I text my brother and say, "Tell Billy that I
73	called the cops and they're on their way." And he texts back and said, "No, I want him
74	arrested." So will Humboldt County respond and all I have to say is that the tribe has excluded
75	him from the reservation? I want to know what to do in this situation.
76	
77	Nicole Provolt: Orick District. I know I made this at a previous tribal member comment, but I
78	just want to express how extremely difficult it is to hear through the Zoom platform when you
79	guys are at the Weitchpec office. And I hope that IT (Information Services Department), or you
80	know, some department, is looking into solutions because having the Zoom option is very, very
81	much appreciated. I know for other people, but specifically for me personally. I really like being
82	able to listen in and hear everything that's going on. When you guys are in Klamath, it's perfect.
83	It's clear. I can hear everything when you're in Klamath, but when you are Weitchpec, it's
84	almost not worth listening because it's so difficult to hear. So, I just wanted to reiterate that
85	and hope that that can be something that can be looked at in the future. Thank you.
86	Elizabeth Davis: East District. I was wondering on the agenda yesterday, if you got to any of the
87	roads information because my question is, if the road going to Marilyn and Gaylord Lewis is a
88	tribal road or a county road? They bought a vehicle and it ended up hitting a rock and now
89	their vehicle is disabled and in the shop and poor Gaylord had a hitchhike down the hill a couple

90	times trying to find out information on the status of his car in the shop being fixed. But there	
91	seems to be some big rocks in the road and just wondering if it's a tribal road, county road or	
92	what if we could get a little bit of help fixing their road so they don't continue to ruin their	
93	vehicles going up and down their road. I just wanted to bring that information forward because	
94	they're having a really hard time without a vehicle right now. And then like I said, they've	
95	purchased the one from Mickey's in town and then had the incident and now they are trying to	
96	tell Mickey's that they don't want that vehicle because it's not suitable for their drive up the	
97	hill, but they don't seem to want to work with them. And along that line, hopefully we can get	
98	an elder advocate soon so they can advocate on their behalf and let Mickey's know that this is	
99	an elderly couple. We do a lot of business as tribal members and people at that business need	
100	to do right by this couple because they just need a decent vehicle to get up and down their	
101	road.	
102		
103	Larry Alameda: I live up the hill on Alameda Road and I have no power, no septic or anything.	
104	The power I would like to have been solar, the no power doesn't bother me as much, but like in	
105	the wintertime it's dark up there. And I stayed up there last night and my only light is a	
106	flashlight, and I was wonder if the solar thing is still a go or not?	
107		
108	Jewel Frank: My name's Jewel. I live in Weitchpec District and my tribal comment is that we	
109	can't see (everyone), we only see the left side of Weitchpec conference room. I see Sherri, I see	
110	Mindy, I see Phil, and I'm thinking across the room maybe be the Weitchpec representative, but	
111	I don't know if the person is there or not, and maybe East District. So, I just wanted to refer to	
112	that because it is difficult to see everyone.

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126	TRIBAL MEMBER COMMENT:	
127	Rose Sylvia: So, I have huge concern with this item. My first concern is that this item is put on	
128	for action. As Council, you have an ordinance, which is the law for Tribe. And to just be able to	
129	put on an action item to waive that law, to do something, I think is hugely concerning as a Tribal	
130	Member. My second thing is, and I've said this and I'm going keep saying it, I'm not going quit	
131	saying it. I wanted to say it at the Annual (Membership) Tribal Meeting (held on October 1,	
132	2022), but I think that there needs to be a position paper from an outside attorney on conflict	
133	of interest in this Tribe. I wonder if you, Vice Chairman, weren't the President of the	

135 item would be on our table today, I think that your fiduciary responsibility is to the tribe, not to 136 the corporation, but action items are coming to the tribe from the corporation. This is an action 137 in favor of that corporation and not the tribe. Sovereign immunity is a huge thing for tribes. It's 138 tested all the time, not just Yurok, but all the tribes across the United States are constantly in 139 the fight on the definition of what sovereignty is. It's protected in our constitution. And that's 140 how that Supreme ordinance was written, saying that only the Council, only the Council had 141 that right. But this action item before you guys today is not from Council. It's from the 142 Corporation. Even if you're a Councilmember, it's not from Council. And I'm going to keep 143 saying it. I'm going to keep saying, it's a conflict. It's a huge conflict of interest. And I don't know 144 how the Council can even entertain the action either. It's like it came from the corporation, 145 their decision, I don't know how to say it clearly, but I'm just so totally against even the 146 conversation that's happening at the table. Because it's not this Council that's presenting it's 147 the President of the Corporation. I'm frustrated, right? Like, so I just think that this Council 148 needs to put an action item on to have an outside attorney look at that conflict of interest. I 149 keep getting told we're not in conflict of interest because we have nothing monetarily. But you 150 took \$8 million and gave it to the construction company. That's money from the Tribe. But the 151 decision that's made at this table by the Council, not high members of the corporation. So, I'm 152 just going to say it again. I'm very concerned that you're willing to take an ordinance and waive 153 the conditions of the ordinance in favor of a corporation when that action needs to be done 154 here at the table, in the favor of the tribe. That's your fiduciary responsibility. That's what you 155 were elected for to make sure that we stayed safe on this side and whatever that is, I think it's a 156 lot more detailed than just putting an action item on the table without all of the backup, 157 without all of the attorney review, without looking at case law across the country for how it's 158 going to hinder our sovereignty in the future. Thank you.

160 Sid Nix: Weitchpec District. I have a problem with the Weitchpec District Council Member still 161 doing meetings on Zoom. I don't know where he is at today or if he is on travel. But for our 162 meetings, he can't even come up the road and have a meeting with us, with the people in his 163 District. So, I don't know how come Council keeps approving his travel if he can't even meet 164 with his own constituency. So, I mean that must change. And I don't know what in the future, 165 what his meetings are going to be, but they can't be on zoom. Half the people in Weitchpec 166 District don't even have internet. The Constitution says he must meet with the people in his 167 District. So, I mean, the new village doesn't even have internet. You go up Mitchell Road, 168 there's people up there don't have internet, so that's one problem I have. The other problem is 169 with the Corporations. I don't know what's going on, but any time that a conflict is perceived, it's a conflict. You know that you got a Councilmember sitting on the Board of the Corporation. 170 171 To me, it's a conflict. It's always been a conflict. And to me, it's like Rose said, it just keeps going 172 on and on and on. I don't know when Council's, going to take control of that. You know that the 173 Corporation bought the golf course. We're in a global warming. How are you going to take water out of the Trinity River to keep those greens, green? And how does any Councilmember 174 175 think that they can take a business, a failing business, and turn it around? You know, where did 176 he come from? Toby doesn't have an experience on running businesses. He just came off the 177 street, but it keeps going and going. And soon that the elders aren't even going to get the 178 hundred dollars or \$200 a year if you keep buying these businesses and failing? There's no 179 reporting on how much they're making. I mean, he doesn't even come out to the district and 180 tell us anything. So, I mean, I came down here, because I've been hearing about this

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- 181 corporation. I'm disappointed in the Council. I mean, if you guys can't take control and
- represent the people, then you don't need to be sitting there. That's all I got to say. Thank you.
- 183
- 184 Jewel Frank: (poor audio) I just wanted to mention the word moral turpitude, you know, like
- 185 society norms and moral code. And regarding, my District Representative, Toby
- 186 Vanlandingham, there was a time that I was cyber bullied by him. I have the evidence. I took a
- 187 picture when he illegally excluded my son for defending himself. He never came and made
- payment to me. He's a Yurok man I'm not done yet. I just say that out loud because it's on my
- 189 heart and I'm hurting. In regards to these corporations, is that I looked at some of the bylaws
- 190 and when I looked up at some of the minutes, it looked like there was three people, and I don't 191 believe three people make a guorum. I believe it was Vanlandingham, Aubrey and Green who
- believe three people make a quorum. I believe it was Vanlandingham, Aubrey and Green who
 made passed motions to purchase property. That was just three people, I think two
- 193 Councilmembers at the time, and maybe Green was a Secretary. And it also stated to be to be a
- 194 part of this, that the Chairman must appoint a President. And I don't recall seeing in that any of
- 195 the minutes that Toby was appointed the President of the Yurok Agriculture Corporation. I
- 196 haven't seen any documents stating that. I just read it in the Bylaws for Yurok Agriculture
- 197 Corporation. I think the bylaws were signed by Mindy and Joe and I can't remember what date
- 198 in 2019. And so, it's a young company, but it also states that the CEO who oversees
- 199 management finances and staff functions. The only thing I ever see about the CEO were
- 200 pictures of her on Facebook.

225 TRIBAL MEMBER COMMENT:

226 Nellie McNeal: I'm here for tribal member comment about the church down at Wautek, I'm

227 sorry to say we didn't have insurance on our church, so I'm sorry. It's always (been) church I'd

228 like it to stay a church building. You can always get help. The lady, she was nice enough to let

229 us first use it as a dance hall upstairs, it's a two-story building. So that's how we got the church

- 230 there. But then the lady and her family had a tragic accident at Berry Summit and killed them 231 all, so that was pretty sad. Memories of her, I stick up for her right. Her place there, in Wautek.
- 232

233 Earl Davidson: Yeah, I'd like to address this YAC and its whole creation. To sidestep tribal 234 safeguard seems like to me from what I've read here and the lack of disclosure is kind of 235 unnerving, but not informing tribal members of it seems kind of underhanded and shady at 236 best. And I think, Tribal Council needs to investigate this more before you pass anything along 237 the lines. Thank you for your time and consideration on this matter.

238

239 James Dunlap: First of all, I'd like to address an issue that my cousin has with the Weitchpec 240 Waterline system going across his property without an easement. This has been brought to the 241 Executive Director, Mr. Barnes, which was passed off to the Planning Department. None of 242 which have got a response. I just want go on record that this water line that was put across 243 there without an easement or without permission. Something should be done, I mean, there's 244 a reasonable expectation that this system should be done in a legal manner instead of just 245 bulldozing a road through and putting a pipe in regardless of who owns the property. I would 246 ask that Council make note because the Executive Director refuses to engage even though he 247 claims relationship problems, it's a second cousin, once removed, and that's not a close family 248 tie that would prevent him from addressing the issue. And then this whole YAC program has 249 been nothing but a money pit. I think you guys are beginning to realize that the yarn that 250 Councilman Vanlandingham has been spinning is just that. And I think you're beginning to see 251 that and hopefully you'll take actions before it gets much worse because every story, every 252 proposal that he has put in front of you, and that we're going to make millions, that it's a 253 profitable investment, has not come true.

254

255 I think somebody pointed out that even the bylaws are in violation because they require 256 somebody that is a professional with experience. As a high school dropout, that does not 257 qualify for someone to be running a corporation with in excess of \$5 million of assets that are 258 tribal member assets. He can waive all tribal safeguards so that this corporation can get loans, 259 that they can hock the assets they have right now, there is next to no control over this other 260 than Mr. Vanlandingham's word. And the fact that when he engages with people on social 261 media, he doesn't answer their questions, he'll just talk in circles, or he'll answer questions with 262 other questions. And I think you guys are beginning to see that the picture that he paints is not 263 as rosy as he claims. And I would ask that you consider my recommendation. I'm going to ask 264 that you consider dissolving the YAC before it gets us into further financial debt. Because every, 265 every option, every aspect, and every venture that he has proposed and done with the YAC is 266 costing us money. 267

268 There is no financial return, there is no magic field of dreams that after five years, it's 269 automatically going to turn a profit. All these financial ventures are losing money. I think they

270	need at some point we need to accept our losses, cut our losses, and turn the assets over to the		
271	YEDC Raymond Bacon, I have the utmost respect, not only in his ability, but is in his integrity.		
272	The guy will not lie to us. I would ask that Council seriously consider taking these actions to		
273	stem off a potential disaster. I would ask that you guys' vote, not just table it, but vote it down.		
274	And I endorse what Rose said that this is such a grievance and blatant conflict of interest. I		
275	would ask that you please do due diligence and put a stop to this madness. Thank you.

332	Bea Nix: Weitchpec District, Sid and I sitting here getting familiar with the program. That means	
333	so much to us and what others are going through is sort of heartbreaking because this shouldn't	
334	be. But at the same time, I'm privileged to be on the list.	
335		
336	Elizabeth Davis: Good afternoon, this is Elizabeth Davis. Thank you for that information. We	
337	have received comments from many elders that they really do appreciate the lunch. I just	
338	wanted to say that I think we need more collaboration maybe with the new elder advocates.	
339	Part of their duties could be to help deliver those lunches because it is only once a week at this	
340	point. And then we also need more collaboration with United Indian Health Services (UIHS) next	
341	door. They have three Community Health Representatives (CHRs) on board now and we need	
342	more collaboration with them and hopefully our new elder advocates when they do come	
343	aboard. Now this should be a priority, finding these elder centers for lunches and creating a	
344	space for interaction with the elders. It should be a priority in finding that along with a spot to	
345	house our beautiful baskets. We're putting other priorities in front of two important ones in	
346	my mind. You know, so I would implore the Council to just review their priorities and make	
347	these two items a priorities in the endeavors that we do. And along with that, we have a brown	
348	bag program that we've had for many years here and we don't have a dedicated person to	
349	deliver those brown bags to those that can't come and pick it up. So again, maybe that could be	
350	incorporated into the elder advocates that are to be coming on, hopefully soon that could be	
351	part of their duty because again, that's only once a month. So I'm looking for ways to have	
352	some collaboration with some of theses positions. Thank you.	
353		
354	Sid Nix: Sid Nix, Weitchpec District, about the lunches. We appreciate the lunches, but I would	
355	want a system that's hybrid where you could have the lunches delivered to people's homes. I'm	
356	against having a centralized lunch place as the only option. You're going to have a lot of people	
357	not coming to the centralized place to eat. So, I want to go on record to saying that we need to	

358 continually give people a choice. Do we want to come down to eat fine? If they want to stay

- 359 home fine too.
- 360

361 Georgiana Gensaw: One thing I'd like to say about the kitchen use and how Laura's explaining 362 the difficulties of the kitchen availability. I always try to get more than a day notice, but there 363 are times that departments hold luncheons or office parties, for example, Council Installation. 364 Several things that are going on at the office (all at once). And so, there's always competition, 365 especially during the summer and then the winter too for that matter, everyone wants the 366 kitchen. And it's not something you would think of that has to be like regulated, but it is. One 367 thing that I banked on being a relief was the new Aawok Ada Charles Emergency Operations 368 (Aawok Ada) building and when that comes to fruition, that's going to take care of so many 369 problems and so many issues. And to have that building sit there now for two years, going on 370 three years and not having it accessible and usable for staff and community members for 371 funerals and weddings, it's heartbreaking as a community member, as a tribal member, it is 372 heartbreaking to see that building sit there. And then for me to be over there on the side doing 373 my job and trying to juggle space and buildings and, and to have that beautiful kitchen, 374 completely stainless steel, a complete commercial kitchen is not being used and can't be used. 375 It's devastating, it's heartbreaking. I can't reiterate enough how much Klamath community is 376 missing out because that still is inaccessible.
