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TRIBAL MEMBER COMMENT:

Ruthie Maloney: Ruthie Maloney from the South District. I wanted to just say it was very nice to see everybody yesterday and I just wanted to just thank the Tribe too. You guys are doing great work and I just once again wanted to come and remind the Tribe that I've been working in the marine arena since I left the tribe back in 2014. So, just a reminder that John Corbett, me, and other tribal members have been working on a Tribal Marine Collaborative. So, I really would like the Yurok Council to please keep in mind the North Coast Native Protectors, which is a tribal nonprofit. And I would, would really like to help the Yurok Tribe develop a marine grant proposal, including funding for a marine department, and establish a federal marine sanctuary for salmon. A recent funding award that Tolowa and Resighini Rancheria received, from Ocean Protection Council was for 3.6 million for the next three years to develop their program for the Tribal Marine Stewards Network. A lot of Resighini ancestral lands is within Yurok ancestral lands. We also have Trinidad Rancheria that has a sign going up at their pier that also has wording, regarding Yurok ancestral territory. So, I really think it's very important that we as people stand firm on our Marine, uses of our cultural uses of the marine area. So, I just am, requesting if and asking if you would like a presentation (from) myself and John Corbett. And I'm also even hoping to get Alicia McQuillan-Perez, who was also involved back in when we worked in the Office of Tribal Attorney when we did have a grant that we proposed with Resources Legacy Fund. So, I'm just requesting, you know, I would love to work again with the tribe regarding the marine information. Thank you. Wok-hlew' Thank you.

Jeremiah Swain: I am member of North District. I wanted to come make a comment in regards to housing. In the last couple of weeks, my grandmother, Elder of the Yurok Tribe, has been given a 60-day notice. They waited until she was in the hospital, unable to do anything, then gave her three notices within a week. According to the housing policy, you get three notices and then they can go forward and start evicting you. It's very strange that they would wait until she's in the hospital to do these kinds of things. She's 80 plus years old. She's been in this house for 15 plus years through housing. She's on a fixed income. I've seen some of the listings and problems on why they are kicking her out. We've gone forward to fix most of those. We paid the back rent, tried to help clean the place up. She has friends and elders who are allowed to come over. It just upsetting. But we are scheduling a meeting at the end of the day to see what can be done about this situation. Thank you.

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TRIBAL MEMBER COMMENT:

Jewel Frank: I just wanted to say this Zoom meeting, even though I'm grateful to be a part of this meeting, it's kind of frustrating because my bandwidth is low and it's creating anxiety for me because I can't see who's talking for one thing and it's hard to follow. And so, I'm going to try to listen as best I can. But I just wanted to mention, that as much as I'm grateful for this opportunity to be a part of this meeting. I want to know about the agenda item regarding the CA22-267 Exclusion of Tribal Corporations from Supreme Ordinance. But when I try to follow the Zoom thing, it's like I, I can't see who's talking and, and I won't be able to follow along the discussion on this item. I just wanted to mention that. Thank you.

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Elsie McLaughlin-Feliz: I currently live in the South District but graduated from Jack Norton School, so I understand the importance of focusing on our schools. I came away from school with an understanding of, we, first of all, we had great teachers, they're gone now, but, so strengthening our current staff, our current members to become our teachers, as opposed to try and that's changing it from the inside. So, we're not trying to get someone from the outside to understand what they need to teach us, but to get our own teachers, to teach our own kids is important. And focusing on education of our children is more than just one school. So, thinking of it globally, all of our students, regardless of where they live, deserve a quality education. So just keep that in mind. We have such a large population that don't attend Margaret Keating or don't have the honor of going to Jack Norton like I did. So, thank you

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Jim McQuillen: We need to recruit, like Elsie just shared, we need to recruit for teachers, and build for the future. We've been talking in education about honoring the teachers we do have right now because some of them are getting ready to head down the road into something called retirement. Like was mentioned, Mrs. Wilder or Mr. Nova, and maybe Mr. Crawford has taken a break. But we have very few teachers remaining and are trying to use that as a springboard to get young people to consider the career and profession of teaching. There is not many coming down the road. HSU used to graduate over 200 teachers per year. They're, under 100 now. And very, very few are American Indians coming out of HSU. So, we need to do more. You'll see some proposals coming down the roads. There used to be something called Future Teachers of America, like a club-based program where kids could learn cross age tutoring, they

178 could get their feet wet, explore teaching, and go out and meet with teachers. We need our own people teaching in the schools. Thank you.

Jewel Frank: I know some time ago there was like a solar grant that came out and some tribal members were support to get it, like Larry Alameda Sr. He spoke with Frankie but nobody got back to him. I just wanted to be out loud about this because it is really frustrating to him. He made phone calls, and the messages were full so there was no way for him to leave a simple phone message. There's been a breakdown of communication of who to contact. Thank you for listening.

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Elizabeth Davis: I was just going to second what Jewel said because there was an announcement of the availability of solar for elders in this area, but I don't think the application ever opened. And I've had a few inquiries about it and I've had passed it along to Ms. Lay in Planning. But I don't know if they've ever got an application process down yet or not. And the other comment I wanted to make was, I hope with the new utility department that we could do a better job of billing because it seems to be a real issue right now with water billing and internet billing. And we don't have a steady staff that does that job and hoping that we could do a better job in that department. And I wanted to mimic her response that since Covid, it is really hard to get ahold of employees. There was an email that went out asking for everybody's contact number, and I think I got two responses. We need phone numbers, tribal wide, on how to get ahold of staff in other areas. It's much needed and I can feel the frustration from tribal membership when they try to call, but it's even more frustrating as a staff member. When I try to call and either somebody's phone message box is full, or there isn't a current phone number,

it's frustrating. Our phone listing needs to be updated ASAP. Thank you.

receive the card to be a part of that meeting. I believe it was in Tulley Creek. That's all for me.
